## Healthcare, biotech hot favourites with investors 15+ Startups Incubated In Ahmedabad-Gandhinagar Got Funding In 2022

Ahmedabad: Redicine, an artificial intelligence (AI) based startup that reminds patients to take medicine on stipulated time, got the first round of funding in 2022. Founded by the management and engineering graduates Kush Prajapati, Dhaumil Parmar, Raj Shah, Harsh Mangukiya, the healthcare solution was in prototype for a couple of years, but last year saw its application in so-me city-based hospitals and also got valued for its funding round.

demic played a major part in the turnaround for several of the startups in the healthcare and wellness segment. re is more acceptance of such ideas and confidence among

investors," he said. His is one of the 15-plus startups from Ahmedabad Gandhinagar-based in cubators that have got fun-ding in the last year. Satya Ranjan Acharya, a professor at EDII and director of incu-

bator Cradle where Redicine is incubated, said the trend started DHANDHO in 2020 with young entrepreneurs who

saw the opportunity in the pandemic. "The trend continued in

2022 – out of 13 of our startups that got funding in 2022, five were in the healthcare seg-

ment. There have been more innovation-driven solutions ranging from core engineering (medical devices) to patient care and application-based services. One of this year's winners at our annual

meet on Monday was LymbEd-ge, an Ahmed-abad-based bio-medical star-TIMEStup that helps pa-

tients rehabilitation," he said.

Likewise, at GUSEC – in-cubator at Gujarat University –10 new startups in healthcare and healthtech and 6 in biotech got incubated. In comparison, the artificial intelli-

gence/machine learning sector got 6 new startups, 13 in edutech, 5 in electric vehicles and 4 in fintech. Rahul Bhag-chandani, group CEO and executive director of GUSEC, said that about Rs 60 crore funding was received by the startups in fintech, food, mo-bility, healthcare, energy and agritech at the incubator in

Ahmedabad: Healthcare, he alth technology and biotech-nology are some of the sectors that saw a funding boom after the outbreak of Covid-19 in 2020. The surge continued in 2022 with several innovative startups getting funds and significant traction. The trend is here to stay, said Harkesh Mittal, the chairman of Startup India Seed Fund Scheme, who spoke to TOI on the sidelines of

urship Deve-lopment Insti-tute of India in Gandhinagar. "Post-Covid, biotech and health tech have gained atten-

tion. We are seeing many star-tups in drug discovery and delivery vaccine carriers for deliery in remote areas, and early diagnostics etc. Contactless services have also garnered in-terest," said Mittal, adding that conventional sectors such as IT are also doing well. "A few venture capitalists are also av-ailable for the healthcare sector," he added.

Mittal said that there is mo-re opportunity for startups to receive government funding. "There have been complaints that there's too much paper-work involved. While it's being simplified. I want to clarify that the funding (from government) is easier in the long run. as the returns on investment is

not the only criterion," he said. adding that Gujarat is among the top states getting funds from the seed fund scheme.

Dr Sunil Shukla, director

general of EDII, told TOI that the startup scenario has matured over the years, and there have been more avenues for funding. "For example, for entrepreneurs from marginalized communities, there is an ASE-EM scheme, whereas there are special funds for projects pertaining to livelihoods and ru-ral social in-

novations," he said, adding that edu-

tech, fintech, delivery services, healthtech, wellne ss and biotech were im portant sectors to look out for

Empresario, the startup meet at EDIL was inaugurated by MoS (home) Harsh Sanghavi on Monday, "Guiarat is on the road to becoming one of the most progressive startup destinations in the country through a merger of proactive policies, strong institutional setup, and dynamic participation of the private sector," he said. "The state has introdu-ced several changes in regulations and clauses to create a conducive ecosystem. Gujarat has successfully addressed the concerns of startups through innovative and sustainable solutions, and through setting up of incubators and accelera-tors," he added.

GAZING INTO THE FUTURE: Startup incubators from the city were asked about the projections for 2023. They mentioned radiology interpretation platforms. robotics, space technology, gaming, logistics, clean energy, etc., as indications of the future. The innovations were rooted in the city. The experts indicated that 2020 and 2021 saw a boom in mobile-based services and education technology, which has stabilized. They highlighted the untapped potential in the use of technology in sectors such as agriculture. transport, and remote services like psychological assessments with the advent of 5G.

uoting the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT) figures, Hi-ranmay Mahanta, CEO of iHub, said that till January 2023, Gujarat had about 6,300 startups out of which 34% or about one-third were in healthcare and life sciences.

"Gujarat being the hub of pharmaceutical industry and manufacturing, the sechas seen phenomenal

growth in the past couple of years," he said.
At CIIE.CO, the incuba-

tor at IIM Ahmedabad (IIM-A), the prominent new startups for the year 2022 included in the sectors including healthcare, mobility, clean tech, fintech, enterprise tech and consumer tech. The state government last year introduced the state-level incubator for medical colleges to encourage medical students to venture into startups and entrepreneurship.
